

ISASP Reading Grade 5 Practice Test Constructed Response Rubric

2 pts	<p>Difference in perspective is accurately described AND supported with details from the story. If the story was told from the Mom’s point of view, it wouldn’t be about the dog or the cat or even Erica until the very end. It would be about getting the family ready to leave for the game, and probably about how chaotic everything was. For example, she has to deal with Danny being upset about the pancakes and hurry everyone along.</p> <p>Difference in perspective is accurately described AND supported with details from the story. ‘I think the biggest difference in perspective would be how surprising the cat would be to the mom. She didn’t hear Erica talking about Duke’s behavior since she was focused on getting ready to leave. The story would probably be about how anxious she was to get going, but then focus on her surprise and concern when they see the kitten.’</p>
1 pt	<p>Difference in perspective is described or strongly implied, but text support is missing, insufficient, or irrelevant. ‘Erica’s mom would be more distracted than Erica.’</p> <p>Difference in perspective is described or strongly implied, but text support is missing, insufficient, or irrelevant. Mom’s perspective would definitely be more anxious, based on the things she says in the story.</p>
0 pts	<p>Difference in perspective provided is not supported by text. Erica’s mom doesn’t like the dog as much as Erica, since she ignores Duke. She also isn’t happy about the cat.</p> <p>No difference in perspective is described. That’s a pretty smart dog. I think Erica and her mom would agree on that.</p>

General Constructed Response Scoring Guidelines:

- Three to five sentences is considered an appropriate response length to adequately answer a constructed response. However, length does not count toward score. A response that satisfies the criteria for one or two points will earn that score, regardless of length.
- Spelling and grammar (including using complete sentences) do not count toward score. Responses, however, must be clear and understandable.
- Unless it contradicts the rest of the response, extraneous information will not reduce points earned.
